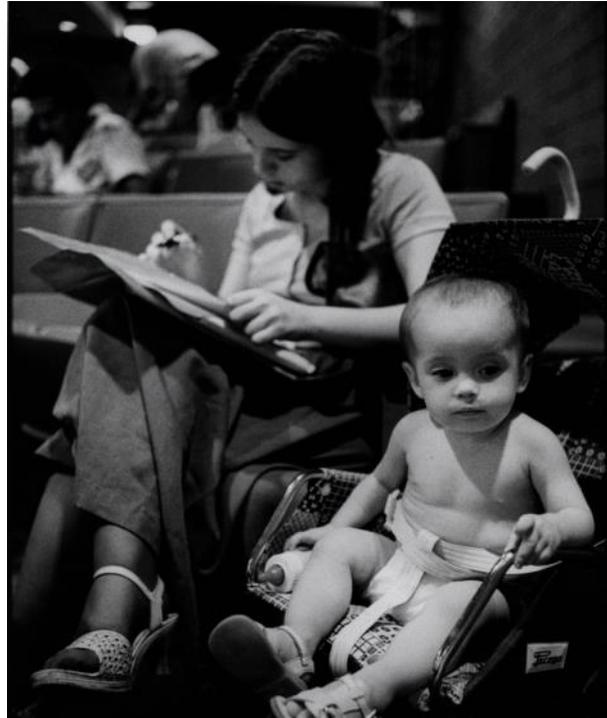

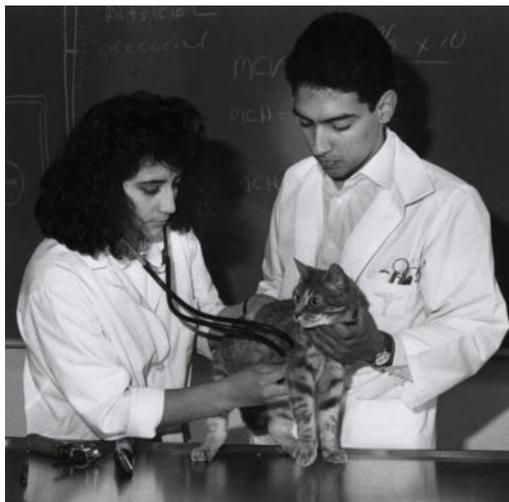

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Library Instruction and Learning Matters Mini-Grant

This year, the Library received a Learning Matters Mini-Grant from the college's Center for Teaching and Learning in the "sustaining comprehensive efforts for connecting core competencies into the curriculum" category. The grant presents an opportunity for the Library to reexamine our library instruction teaching content for LaGuardia's First Year Seminars. These efforts coincided with the Association of College & Research Libraries *Framework for Higher Education for Information Literacy*, approved in January 2016; the new Framework shifts away from a set of prescriptive skills toward a cluster of six interconnected core concepts. Serendipitously, this shift coincides with LaGuardia's efforts to update the college's Core Competencies and Abilities. The Library has always adapted to technological and pedagogical advances but confluence of the ACRL *Framework* and the college's Core Competencies created an ideal opportunity for the Library to reexamine our teaching content throughout the curriculum.

While Library faculty have been active participants during the development of the Core Competencies and Abilities, we have yet to formally incorporate the Core Competencies and Abilities into our own curriculum. With its emphasis on conceptual teaching, the Framework is compatible with the College's Core Competencies and Abilities. Used together, the Library will be able to connect information literacy principles with departmental and programmatic teaching priorities, aligning our curriculum on the national and local level. *(Continued on page 6)*

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Websites in a Flash: No Previous Experience Necessary

LibGuides is a user friendly platform that allows anyone to create a Website with a few clicks and some typing. Basically if you can cut, paste, drag, and drop, you can very easily produce site using LibGuides. Neither web coding nor web design experience is need to create Web content using the LibGuides platform. LaGuardia's Library Media Resources Center started using LibGuides several years ago to create just that -- guides to the Library's services and resources. You can see the Library's research and service guides on our Website at: <http://library.laguardia.edu/webguide>. But the platform can be used for more than just creating Web guides for the Library.

Any kind of content can be made available on the Web using LibGuides, e.g. course materials and content, research, program and option information, department or club information, etc. What makes the LibGuide platform so convenient is once your site is on the Web, you can edit it in real time wherever you are without going through an intermediary like a Web master. If you are at all interested in an easy, maintenance-friendly way to develop a Web presence to showcase your scholarship or course content give LibGuides a try. 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Wait, I Can Stream Videos at LaGuardia?

Yes, you can! It's easy through our databases which can be accessed on the Library's homepage. The best way to find them is to go to "Find articles & books online (subscription databases)." From there, go to "Select a subject to find databases on your topic" and click on "[Videos](#)." You'll find several listings, but we'll focus on three: LaGuardia Streaming Media, Academic Video Online: Premium, and Kanopy Streaming Videos.

- *LaGuardia Streaming Media* can only be accessed on-campus. It is our collection of DVD and VCR recordings that have been digitized and, in many cases, close-captioned. The search box enables you to look for videos by title or keyword. We also have a list of our complete collection and of the new titles that are added each month.

- *Academic Video Online: Premium*, from Alexander Street Press, is a multidisciplinary collection of thousands of videos with 400 being added each month. You can search the entire database, or you can narrow your search by subject or by collection. This database can be viewed on- or off-campus and most videos are closed captioned.
- *Kanopy Streaming Videos* is our latest acquisition. Containing over 26,000 documentaries, art-house and indie films, students and faculty can view this database on- or off-campus. Kanopy also carries the Criterion Collection/Janus Films, a collection of award-winning films. Most videos are closed captioned.

of New York State's population. This plan comes as a response to the overwhelming amount of student debt that people of all ages face these days as well as an effort to improve the economic mobility for people in a state with a very high cost of living.

However, this is not the first time a Governor Cuomo has come to LaGuardia Community College. In 1985 Governor Mario Cuomo

came to the College with his son Andrew, and current Governor, to announce \$150,000 of funding for the Programs for Deaf Adults. Used to offset costs for educating the deaf, an important issue due to the high number of people born deaf as a result of the mid-1960's rubella epidemics, this was the first time the College received direct state funding for any type

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For 2016-2017, this means that the Library will work to incorporate both LaGuardia's Core Competencies and Abilities and the *Framework* into our curriculum; this work will focus on the one-hour Library instruction classes for all eight current First Year Seminars. Practically, this has meant mapping each First Year Seminar to a concept from the Framework and then to the Core Competencies and Abilities; then, we are writing new lesson plans and activities that

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The winners of the Competition continue to excel in their academic studies. Victoria Lindsay (1st place) attended LaGuardia for two years and transferred to John Jay College in the Fall of 2016. Her goal is to become a lawyer. In addition to pursuing her degree, she works part-time to pay for her college education. Mark Rucktenwald (2nd place) has just started the Registered Nursing program at LaGuardia. He expects to graduate in the Spring of 2018. Upon graduation, he intends to pursue a Bachelors of Science in Nursing (BSN) degree at Hunter College or NYU. He is also a member of Phi Theta Kappa Honor Society.

Jennifer Tsuei (2nd place) is a part-time evening student at LaGuardia. Jennifer states that "For almost my entire life, I've never liked English classes--much less writing papers--so doing research for this ENG 102 paper and receiving recognition for it is very new and astonishing to me." She credits Dr. Koh "for scrutinizing every comma she has written for the class, for instilling in her a deep love of literature and literary theory, and for constantly challenging and inspiring her to reach for greater heights in her thinking, her writing, and in life." She also states that "receiving this award is a huge affirmation of her work and has fueled her confidence and joy in utilizing the LaGuardia library resources even more fully." She thanks the LaGuardia librarians and everyone at the Circulation Desk for making the LaGuardia library feel like a second home to her.

Other winners include Patrick Hercules (3rd place) who will graduate in 2017. He is a liberal arts major focuses on Media Studies. In addition to pursuing a degree, Patrick works part-time to help pay for his college education. Somayah Aljahmi is another 3rd place winner. She transferred to Queens College in the Fall of 2016. Presently, she is pursuing a major in Mathematics and Secondary Education.

On September 29th, Prof. Caron Knauer attended a special photo session with her two students who won in the competition, Victoria Lindsay and Patrick Hercules. One of the second place winners, Jennifer Tsuei, was also present. All of the participants received a *Certificate of Participation in September. They were especially pleased to receive recognition from President Mellow. Many of the students are already making plans to enter the 2017 competition.*

We extend our thanks to the dedicated classroom instructors who help us promote the competition and who inspire and motivate their students to achieve their best.
