Example Type	Abbreviation
<b>People or Organizations:</b>	
Compiler or compilers	comp. or comps.
Corporate authors	<p>Sigmund Freud states that a "dream is a fulfillment of a wish" (154).</p> <p>Smith developed the argument in his 1997 book (185-91).</p>
Edited by; translated by, etc.	<p>Abbreviate in parenthetical in-text citations only. Use full names in "Works Cited" list.</p> <p>Example: In 1988 a federal report observed that "current high level of attention to child care is directly attributable to the new workforce trends" (United States, Dept. of Labor 147).</p> <p><b>Works Cited</b></p> <p>United States, Department of Labor. <i>Child Care: A Workforce Issue</i>. Government Printing Office, 1988.</p>
Editor or Editors	ed. or eds.
Publishers' names	<p>Do not abbreviate. Exceptions: UP for "University Press"; P for "Press" in name of an academic publisher</p> <p>Examples: Cambridge UP; U of Chicago P; MIT P</p>
<b>Parts of works:</b>	
Chapter or chapters	chap. or chaps (in in-text citation)

Issue number or numbers	no. or nos. (in in-text citation)
Page or pages	p. or pp. (in "Works Cited" list only)
Paragraph or paragraphs	par. or pars. (in in-text citation)
